Dining Etiquette 101



Have you ever felt overwhelmed at a dining table? Not sure which bread plate is yours or which fork to use when? Most North Americans have at one time or another depending on your experience with dining etiquette.

When I was growing up my parents always made sure that at least once a month we ate out as a family in a restaurant. It was not only an enjoyable time that we looked forward to but it also created an ongoing learning environment for us children. Our palettes were expanded as they encouraged us to try foods we did not normally eat at home while our manners and etiquette were tested.

This monthly practice did me well when I went to Germany in Grade 11 as an exchange student.

Later, as I moved through ever-expanding roles and was exposed to a variety of fine dining experiences through my work life, I really appreciated that my parents had the foresight to ensure that I at least knew the basic rules of etiquette.

When I worked for Mark Staffing in Calgary, we actually made a meal a part of our recruitment process with an internal candidate. We wanted to see if they knew how to conduct themselves at a table as entertaining our clientele was a regular occurrence for staff. We also held training sessions with a mocked up place setting in our boardroom.

I am sharing these with you now so that you too will feel comfortable at all times when dining socially.

- Never change a name card at a place setting that the hostess has arranged
- When you sit down at your place setting, put your napkin on your lap. You will notice in some fine restaurants that they will give you either a black or white napkin based on the color of your outfit. This is done so that lint from the

napkin does not transfer on to your outfit. Let the waiter place the napkin on your lap.

- If you leave the table temporarily, place your napkin on the seat of your chair until you return.
- When you leave the table at the end of the meal, place your napkin on the left side of your plate.
- Never start to eat until all people at the table have been served and your host or hostess has invited you to begin. This is always given after a blessing is given. In the case of EWI, we don't start to eat until after invocation even if the soup or salad has been pre-set.
- Your bread plate is to your left. Bread is never cut with a knife, but rather pulled or broken apart, even a roll.
- If you are served soup, move the spoon through the soup from the front of the bowl to the back of the bowl and then raise it to your mouth and tilt the side of the spoon towards your mouth. The soup spoon never

goes straight into your mouth. To get the last little bit of soup from the bowl, tip the bowl away from you to fill your spoon.

- If you are wondering which utensil to use, you always work from the outside in towards your plate. How many forks, knives and spoons are laid out will indicate how many courses you are being served and whether or not dessert is to be expected (see diagram below).
- When passing a dish, always pass to the right unless you are passing to a specific person who may have asked you to, "Pass the salt, please."

Note how the woman is holding the utensils in the photo above. This is the correct way. Food is pushed on to the back of the fork with your knife and then raised in that position to your mouth.

If you ever want a demonstration, please feel free to ask me! I have shared this with so many staff members, colleagues and friends over the years and I am happy to do the same with you! The following infographic is a perfect example and lays it all out beautifully.

I hope this is valuable to you, either as new information or as a refresher. If you can master this, you can dine anywhere, with anyone and never feel uncomfortable or unsure of yourself.
